### Wreath Night Success






### LKS2

# **CEC Strategic Leisure Review**

Poynton Town Council have asked us to make you aware that Cheshire East Council are carrying out a Strategic Leisure Review which could result in the closure of Poynton Leisure Centre.

The consultation is currently live and closes on the 7th January. They are urging residents to respond as there is an implication that only those who respond to the consultation will be considered as part of the usage figures – see text from the consultation below.

### Focusing future council investment into Leisure Services

Finally, if the council is unable to meet the required income / savings target through the generation of additional income or through alternative delivery models, the council may have to consider reducing or removing subsidies for some of its sites in the borough.

If this were to happen, **as a last resort**, the council is proposing to focus its continued investment into Leisure Services:

· In the locations where the health of residents is poorest

• On the leisure centre sites where usage is highest. This will consider not only the use of these sites by registered EHL members but also by those community and sports groups who respond to this consultation, as well as where appropriate any use by schools.

• Where the actual cost to operate sites per user is lowest. For each individual site this will consider day to day operating costs, as well as the council's corporate landlord costs, offset by any income generated by individual sites.

#### **Urgent Winter Water Safety Message**

RLSS UK offer safety advice for winter water safety, with simple steps to keep safe during the winter:

- 1. Never go onto the ice to play, to retrieve an object, or a pet Never enter the ice to rescue somebody, call 999 and ask for the Fire and Rescue Service
- What to do if you fall through the ice:
- Keep calm and shout for '<u>help'</u>
  Spread your arms across the surface of the ice in front of <u>you</u>
- If the ice is strong enough, kick your legs to slide onto the ice.
- Lie flat and pull yourself towards the <u>bank</u>
  If the ice breaks, work your way to the bank-breaking the ice in front of you <u>anyway</u>
- In the tee breaks, work your way to the bank-breaking the tee in floht of you <u>any you</u>.
  If you cannot climb out, wail for bpig and keep as still a sposible. Press your arms by your side and keep your legs together. Keep your head clear of the <u>water</u>
  Once you are safe, go to hospital immediately for a check <u>up</u>
  What to do if you see someone fall through the ice:
- Shout for assistance and phone the emergency services call 999 or 112
- Do not walk or climb onto the ice to attempt a rescue
- · Shout to the casualty to 'keep still' and offer reassurance to keep them calm
- Try and reach them from the bank using a rope, pole, tree branch, clothing tied together or anything else which can extend your reach
- When reaching from the bank, lie down to avoid being pulled onto the ica
  If you cannot reach them, slide something which floats, such as a plastic bottle or
  football, across the ice for them to hold onto to stay afloat whilst help is on the <u>way</u>
- If the casually is too far away, do not attempt to rescue them. Wait for the emergency services while calming and reassuring the <u>casualty</u> <u>https://www.riss.org.uk/winter-water-safety</u>
